Publicity

We've just been looking over the new docket and it looks as though the FCC has gone along with the joint Amateur Proposal to some extent. The docket as a whole looks pretty good and should bring the needed new blood into our ranks.

The top ticket will be the new Extra Class license. In order to obtain it you will have to get busy on CW and build up your code speed to 20 WPM which will be the requirment. The theory portion of the exam it appears is going to be more complex than any thing we have had yet.

The next ticket will be the Advanced Class which will entitle you to the same identical priviledges that the class "A" now gives you. All present class "A" holders will we understand be automatically relicensed as Advanced Class which will be open also to new applicants untill Dec. 3I, I95I. After I95I there will be no new Advanced tickets given out and all those desiring priviledges not permitted under General Class will have to take the Extra Class exam.

The General Class will be the same as the present Class "B" and will require the same I3 WPM code test.

The Conditional Class is of course the present Class "C" license, The Technician license we hope will bring some of the wiser and more experienced heads into our UHF ranks in the region above 220 MC. This license requires the applicant to copy code at only 5 words per minute and the same theory exam as that required of General Class applicants.

The Novice Class will open the gates of Hamdom to many who have been having trouble with 13 WPM. This ticket requires the applicant to copy code at 5 WFM and to pass a fairly simple theory and regulations test. However it must be remembered that the Novice Class license cannot be renewed and its holder must make the most of it's one year period to build up his code speed and grasp enough theory to enable him to pass the General Class exam.

There is a very important paragraph (SS I2.27) on renewal of licenses that we hope the boys have read carefully. On renewing your ticket one must state that he can still copy code at the same speed as that originally required when the license was obtained.



It just be remembered that these hard to get boys have the opportunity and do work hundreds of W's, VE's and South Americans and a QSL card to each one of these contacts represents a considerable cash outlay, QSL cards are more expensive and much harder to get for these boys in foriegn lands. As last resort it seems common pratice to send a self addressed envelope into which the DX has but to place his card and mail but he would much rather send them in packs to the QSL Manager. If you have not already done so send a one dollar bill to the QSL Manager to pay for twenty envelopes which will be mailed to you from time to time as your cards come in.



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We want to remind all members to be sure to attend the February meeting and cast their ballot for the new club officers,

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





EDITORIAL

With several good possibilities for a club house and ground in view, there will probably be considerable discussion on this subject. Is it going to be the same way now?" well, we are not going to try to answer that question, but would like to go back a ways in the club history and present a few facts. At the August 5 meeting back in 1931 just three meetings after the club organized, a club house was proposed and two months later the D.V.R.A. had a club house of it's own in a school house at Moon's Nursery in Penna. They rented this house until the Dec. 6th meeting, at which it was voted to move to the II2 field artillery. The Next club house was located at the Trenton Yacht Club on Lamberton Street, and was secured after a vote at the Jan. 3I meeting in 1940. This location was left following the outbreak of the war due to loss of members to the armed forces and FCC's regs keeping Amateur stations off the ether. Although neither of these club houses were owned by the D.V.R.A. they apparently functioned very nicely and with W3AQ on the air. the minutes showed that there was a large number of members on the roster and that a majority of these members were present at the meetings. Whether or not anything definite will be accomplished when the club house matter is brought up, we cannot say, but after reading the club's minutes in their entirety we can truthfully state that a club house is definitely an important factor in keeping a club active and working smoothly. So if the organization decides to build, buy or rent a club house we are 100% with them.



Bob Crozer is plugging away as permanent party at the National Guard, Fort Dix. He is also spending some time as radio instructor for various Guard units.







METERING FOR GRID DIP METERS


The manufactured grid dip meter and the home-constructed unit usually employ a I milliampere meter. If a microameter were subsituted with its appropriate circuit, the grid dip meter becomes more sensitive and therefore more useful. The circuit I am about to describe can be incorporated into any existing grid dip meter or any future construction of a grid dip meter.

Figure I shows the circuit diagram. Basically it is an unbalanced bridge with a negative voltage applied to one side and a positive voltage applied to the other side.



The potentiometer serves to balance or unbalance the bridge.


The common meter connection in grid dip meters is shown in Figure 2 and indicates grid current directly.



A I milliampere meter must be used because the normal flow of grid current is between .4 and .5 milliamperes. Even with the plate voltage turned off but the filament on, the current produced by the electron flow from the heated cathode to the grid is in the vicinity of about .15 milliamperes. From this you can see that a microameter with a full scale reading of IOO or 200 microamperes could not be used. Returning to Figure I we can now see how we can use a microameter in our grid dip meter without having the needle off scale.

As stated above, a negative voltage is applied to one side of the bridge. This negative voltage is produced by the grid current flow. The positive voltage applied to the other side of the bridge is secured from the power supply and is limited by resistor R4. Now if the arm of R3 is moved to the positive end of the network, we are shorting out the positive voltage to ground through R4 and the meter will be deflected off full scale in a positive direction by the action of the negative voltage. If R3 is moved to the negative end of the network, shorting the negative voltage to ground, the meter will be deflected off scale in a negative direction. By moving the arm of R3 to some position between these extremes, the meter can be brought to zero. For our use, however, the meter needle can be brought to about midscale or a little more and kept there, by slight adjustments of R3 to compensate for variations in grid current while the grid dip meter is in use.

Figure 3 shows how this circuit can be applied in practice and gives the resistor values. The positive voltage limiting resistor R4 may have to be adjusted slightly. Two values are given, one for a 150 volt power supply, the other for a 100 volt power supply. The meter can be any low range microameter.

Don't forget the annual election of officers at the March meeting. Support your club and come out and vote for the new officers for 1950.


"1950 Old Timer Nite"

Although neither of these club houses were owned by the D.V.R.A. they apparently functioned very nicely and with W3AQ on the air. the minutes showed that there was a large number of members on the roster and that a majority of these members were present at the meetings. Whether or not anything definite will be accomplished when the club house matter is brought up, we cannot say, but after reading the club's minutes in their entirety we can truthfully state that a club house is definitely an important factor in keeping a club active and working smoothly. So if the organization decides to build, buy or rent a club house we are 100% with them.



ZI was issued his 14th call letter the other day when "W2DOJ" was added to his long list for use at the N.J. State Police Headquarters, up West Trenton way.



METERING FOR GRID DIP METERS


The manufactured grid dip meter and the home-constructed unit usually employ a I milliampere meter. If a microameter were subsituted with its appropriate circuit, the grid dip meter becomes more sensitive and therefore more useful. The circuit I am about to describe can be incorporated into any existing grid dip meter or any future construction of a grid dip meter.

Figure I shows the circuit diagram. Basically it is an unbalanced bridge with a negative voltage applied to one side and a positive voltage applied to the other side.



The potentiometer serves to balance or unbalance the bridge.


The common meter connection in grid dip meters is shown in Figure 2 and indicates grid current directly.



A I milliampere meter must be used because the normal flow of grid current is between .4 and .5 milliamperes. Even with the plate voltage turned off but the filament on, the current produced by the electron flow from the heated cathode to the grid is in the vicinity of about .15 milliamperes. From this you can see that a microameter with a full scale reading of IOO or 200 microamperes could not be used. Returning to Figure I we can now see how we can use a microameter in our grid dip meter without having the needle off scale.

As stated above, a negative voltage is applied to one side of the bridge. This negative voltage is produced by the grid current flow. The positive voltage applied to the other side of the bridge is secured from the power supply and is limited by resistor R4. Now if the arm of R3 is moved to the positive end of the network, we are shorting out the positive voltage to ground through R4 and the meter will be deflected off full scale in a positive direction by the action of the negative voltage. If R3 is moved to the negative end of the network, shorting the negative voltage to ground, the meter will be deflected off scale in a negative direction. By moving the arm of R3 to some position between these extremes, the meter can be brought to zero. For our use, however, the meter needle can be brought to about midscale or a little more and kept there, by slight adjustments of R3 to compensate for varietions in grid current while the grid dip meter is in use.

Figure 3 shows how this circuit can be applied in practice and gives the resistor values. The positive voltage limiting resistor R4 may have to be adjusted slightly. Two values are given, one for a 150 volt power supply, the other for a 100 volt power supply. The meter can be any low range microameter.

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
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
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

* President Truman has proclaimed May 17, 1952 as Armed Forces Day. The Army, Navy and Air Force will offer a double header program for licensed amateur radio operators on this day. There will be a receiving competition sent at 25 wpm and to any operator submitting perfect copy, a certificate of merit signed by the Secretary of Defense will be awarded; Following is a schedule of the times; dall signs and frequencies of the stations sending the test message.

DV'RA NEWS

. . . At 8:00 Pilli; EST; Station WAR will send on 14,405, 20,994 kc. Station AIR will send on 3497.5; 6997.5, 27,994 kc. Station NSS will send on 122, 4390, 9425, 12,360, 17,000 and 22,491 kc. and the second second

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At midnight EST, Station AIR will sned on 3497.5, 6997.5, 27,994 kc. NFG will send on 115, 9255; 12;540; 16;265 kd. WAR will send on 14,405 and 20,994 kc.

Each transmission will be preceded by a five minute CQ. All the stations are located in Washington, D.C. with the exception of NPG which is in San Francisco. (Ed note: As in past would recommend using the frequency of 3497.5 or 4390 as the signals ride in pretty good. However, if the bands are erratic as they have been recently, get an early start as you might have to ckeck all the frequencies to get a good signal.)

Send completed copies to Armed Forces Day Contest, Koom BE 1000, • The Pentagon, Washington 25, D.C.

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For the other part of the double-header, Stations AIR, NSS and War will be on the air between 6:00 P.M. and midnight EST, to contact amateurs. The stations will work on frequencies just outside the 3.5, 7 and 14 mc. bands. Each of the stations will QSL separately to stations contacted. Amateurs are to use amateur frequencies only for contacts with these stations.

WAR will operate on 4025 phone, 6997.5 cw and 13,947.5 cw. AIR will operate on 3497.5 cw, 7635 cw and 14,405 phone. NSS will operate on 4015 phone and 7375 phone.

These schedules are all Eastern Standard Time, so in these parts don't forget to add that hour for DST.

In passing, the certificate given for the receiving competition is really wotth having fellows. This is the third year for Armed Forces Day and in that year 1950, we only had two amateurs in Trenton obtain it. In 1951, there was only one, and all DVRA members too. We stand .. : to be corrected if this information is wrong. **:** .

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Official Bulletin 341 from ARRL Headquarters, April 10 ARRL invites applications for its Official Observer appointment. League members residing in any U.S. or Canadian section are eligible. The various classes of Observer appointment include categories for phone and cw checking which require only receiving equipment and individual skill. All interested amateurs are requested to write ARRL Headquarters for application blanks, a sample 00 Bulletin and full information on how to qualify for Official Observer appointments.

Official Bulletin 342 from ARRL, April 17

FCC announces that the United States, through the Department of State' has concluded an agreement with the Republic of Cuba permitting exchange of traffic on behalf of third parties by amateurs of both countries and pessessions. No compensation may be involved and messages must be of a type that ordinarily would not be sent via public telecommunications facilities. This action, initiated at ARRL request, add Cuba to Canada, Chile, Peru, Ecuador and Liberia, ascountries with which American amateurs may handle third party traffic.

Official Bulletin 343 from ARRL April 21

Fcc proposes amendment of amateur rules to open 75 and 20 meter voice bands to all amteurs except Novice and Technician. FCC also proposes to open 7200 and 7300 kc to voice and to open 80, 40, and 20 meter cw bands also to FSK teletype. A new band 7175 to 7200 kc is proposed for Novices, cw only. Collateral amendments are proposed concerning teletype standards and methods of identification. June OST will carry details. On all these proposals FCC gives ample opportunity for League Board consideration and recommendations at May meeting by inticating July first filing date for comment.

Official Bulletin 344 from ARRL April 29

Effective from three AM May 1, FCC makes available the frequencies 21000 to 21450 kc for amateur use. Temporarily the only emission which will be permitted on 21 mc is A-1 telegraphy. A later rule making will take up phone or other suballocations. Amateurs are cautioned to appraise the television interference problem in their neighborhoods before making extensive use of the new band.

Official Bulletin 345 from ARRL May 2

FCC has released proposals for the suballocation of 21 mc which would provide for 100 kc phone segments at both high and low ends of band, with a Novice band between: 21.15 and 21.3 mc. Type F-1 emission would be permitted in the band 21.1 to 21.35 mc, with cw allowed in the entire 21 mc. band. FCC at the same time proposes to do away with the 11 meter Novice assignment.



DAVID C. NABUTOVSKY W3ITU - W2SMP

Following a long and continued illness, our friend and ardent Brother Member of our Great Fraternity, David C. Nabutovsky, "2SMP, passed from our midst while in slumber.

Licensed in 1937 under the call "SITU, Dave became active in organizational affairs and served as Assistant Section Communications Manager for Southern New Jersey, as well as Phone Activities Manager; and, through his persistence as Chief Operator at Net Control "3AQ, then located in the Trenton Yacht Club, brought into existence the then one and only Southern New Jersey Phone Traffic Net, known as the Southern New Jersey 160 Meter Phone Net, which functioned with admirable efficiency until the close-down with the coming of World War II.

Entering the Armed Service in 1942, Dave was stationed at Radio Operator School in Madison, Wisconsin, where he quickly acquired Army communications training and transferred to the post of radio operator in the Net Control Station of the U. S. Army Coastal Defenses at Fort MacArthur, California, remaining there until release from service in 1945.

Returning to civilian status, Dave promptly stepped back into activity becoming President of the Delaware Valley Radio Association, following which he served the organization in various capacities as Member of the Board, and on the Editorial Staff of the DVRA News.

Most recently, Dave had served as Supervisor of Amateur Radio for Civilian Defense for the City of Trenton until, through ill health he was obliged to relinquish that appointment.

Dave will be sadly missed by his family, his close associates, and his host of friends.

Vith the passing of W2SMP and "Pop" Yoder, Amateur Radio has lost forever a team of the most ardent workers ever known to our Brotherhood.

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Official Bulletin nr 346 from ARRL May 10, 1952 The ARRL Board of Directors at its 1952 meeting May 9 and 10 elected a new president, Goodwin L. Dosland, WØTSN, reelected vice-president "ayland M. Groves, "5NT, appointed Director Percy C. Noble, VIBVR, to serve on executive committee and adoped effective July 1, 1952, new byplaws proposed by the Constitution Revision Committee. In allocations matters the Board, mostly by unanimous decisions, instructed the ARRL General Manager to make the follwoing requests of the Federal Communications Commission:

One, oper 7209 to 7300 kc and 21250-21450 kc for voice operation and extend the ten meter voice band down to 28250 kc.

Two, open 3775 to 3800 kc for mobile phone privileges. Three, continue present novice privileges and add 7150 to 7200 kc for novice cw operation or voice in 51 to 55 mc.

Four continue limiting 75 and 20 meter voice operation to Advanced or higher class licensees and continue issuance new Advanced

Class licenses after end 1952.

Five, permit duplex operation in 51 to 54 mc.

Six, open 7150 to 7200 kc for frequency shift radioteletype operation. The Board continued its policy of providing funds for travel by SCM's, SEC's, and OSL Managers. Other actions include establishing a special membership dues rate of one dollar for blind amateurs without receiving OST, general approval for a national convention in Houston, Texas sometime in 1953, instructions to General Manager to continue studying problem of maritime privileges, and continuance of aggressive program in TVI matters.

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Official Bulletin nr 347 from ARRL May 19, 1952 Reciprocal operating privileges for amateurs of Canada and the United States came a step closer when diplomatic representatives of both governments met recently to bring formally into effect the treaty which provides basic authorization. Fixed, portable and mobile reciprocal privileges are contemplated. There remains now only the issuance by each country of minimum regulations specifying registration and notification procedures. "LA" will bulletin further details when available.

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Official Bulletin nr 348 from ARRL May 28, 1952 Individual amateurs as well as club groups are all invited to report activity in the annual ARPL Field Day, June 21 and 22. Make this a personal exercise in emergency preparedness. Complete and test battery and other emergency powered equipment. Use mobiles for individual and club aggregate mobile scores. Join in club work if you can. Log and reporting froms are now available from ARRL on mail or radiogram request. Send for yours and plan to test amateur radio emergency gear in the ARRL Field Day, June 21 and 22.



Better yet, pick a nice secluded spot on top of a mountain, park in the shade, enjoy the breeze, and ham till your heart's content. If you really want to do a job in mobile work, join your local CD outfit, they can use you.

Highway safety is something we hear and read every day and some of us say "I'm always careful, but it's the other fellow you have to watch." We can always get along with a broken OSO, but a broken back or neck would be a sadder story.

Additionally a new concept of amateur operation is proposed by establishment of permanent calling and answering channels in each band both phone and cw which would be unavailable normally at any time for purposes other than calling and answering for a subsequent shift to other frequencies to continue contact. The channels so limited except in emergencies would comprise 20 kc of each band, 3.5 mc through 144 mc, also 14 kc of 1.7 mc band and 500 kc of the 220 mc. band. September OST carries details. Final comment date September 19. ě.

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Official Bulletin 356 from ARRL July 24 IARU Headquarters has been informed that amateurs of the following countries are permitted to operate on 21 mc: Australia, Belgian Congo, Brazil, Burna, Canada, Cuba, Denmark, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Great Britian, Guatemala, Iceland, Netherlands, Netherlands Antilles New Zealand, Banama, Peru, Southern Rhodesia, Union of South Africa, United States and Uruguay. Several member societies of the Union have advised the Haadquarters that they are in close contact with their government officials and hope to have the 21 mc. band available at an early date.

Official Bulletin 355 from ARRL July 17 U S amateurs desiring to operate in Canada and Canadian amateurs desiring to operate in the U S on visits may now secure authorization to do so. U S amateurs secure, fill out and file forms through Radio Division, Department of Transport, Ottava, Ontario, Canada. Canadian amateurs secure, fill out and file forms though Federal Communications Commission, Washington 25, D.C. Appropriate authorization will then be issued by the respective government agencies and should be shown to customs authorities at the border.

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

During a 144 mc OSO on the 9th, WBBFO, Everett, Ohio, changed to 220 mc., and was heard once by WIHBO, Conton, Conn., who then shifted to 220 to set a new DX record for that band, 450 miles. On the night of August 28th, FASIH, Algiers, worked FUBG, Toulon, France, crossband, 435 to 144 mc, a distance of nearly 500 miles.



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EDITORIAL

Through its years of existence, the DVRA has had various places to call home. Our first real club house was in the former Trenton Yacht club. Operation was on 160 and 75 phone and 80 cw with a 260 foot center fed antenna and a kw transmitter. At this location, the club earned the ARRL Fublic Service Award for providing communications for emergency situation. The club also organized the New Jersey OPS Net here. The start of World Tar II in 1942 partly broke up this and we dug in for a more important job.

Our second club location came shortly after World War II and we again set up shop. The club was then located at North Warren Street in the center of Trenton with the same equipment which had been stored in various places during the ban. Code tables and other equipment was added here. This location, for various reasons, proved fruitless after a year and we were out in the cold again.

This year the DVRA acquired the former radio building at Mercer A irport, which was used by the Navy during the war years. This was made possible by the sponsoring of Civil Defense communications by the club and the efforts of the Mercer County Board of Freeholders. We obtained this location for the primary purpose of providing Mercer County area with Civil Defense and emergency communications, which we are now doing. Three 80 foot masts arranged triangularly, support antennas cut for 80, 75 and 40 meters. A ground plane antenna for 10 meters for communications with the area mobile force is in the planning stage.

Much work has been accomplished by the members in the way of painting, cleaning up, reprirs to the building and general repairs. Rebuilding of the equipment and servicing of the generator is finished. But, that is only the beginning. There is still more to be accomplished and preventative maintenance to be done. We need operators to take care of the schedules.

Our civilian defense obligations are being kept through schedules and net operation. We sincerely feel that we are performing an important service, known to but a few, to the community, city, county, State of New Jersey and the mation as a whole. Let's keep the ball rolling.

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The following article recently appeared in the Sun Refinery News, published at Marcus Hook, Pa., and is well worth reprinting in its entirity. . . .

The S/S Mercury Sun, skippered by Captain Bernard Kellum, played a prominent part last month in the search for the survivors of the 5,500 ton Panamanian tanker, Foundation Star, which split in two off the Carolina Coast on September 6 in rough seas.

Pierre Williams, radio operator of the Sun tanker which was enroute from Texas to Marcus Hook with a cargo of crude oil, picked up the distressed ship's SOS at 3 A.M. Since the Mercury was the only ship in the area with ship-to-shore phone communications, the Coast Guard requested the tanker to stand by and help in rescue operations.

For some 16 hours the Mercury's radio-telephone facilities were used to relay messages from a search plane to Coast Guard ships participating in the rescue operations, and to shore stations. Twentyone crew members of the Foundation Star were rescued and eight were listed as missing.

Radio operator, Williams was on duty in the tanker's radio room from 3:00 A.M. untio 7:10 P.N. without relief, Captain Kellum reported. After dinner, the radioman stood his regular night watch.

After her 16-hour period of service, the Mercury was relieved by a destroyer. The Foundation Star eventually sank during attempted salvage operations.

The Panamanian Tank Flect Corporation, owner of the lost vessel, sent the following messa, e to Sun following the rescue operations.

"We express our sincere appreciation for effort of master, officers and crcw, your vescel, assisting rescue and search for survivors of our S. S. Foundation Star."

Most of us remember Pierre, "EJAG, and sure feel proud to say he is a member of the D.V.R.A. Pierre says in a letter to the editorial office (wow) that he has received permission to operate ham gear on board ship and is at present doing construction work. Congratulations on a swell and worthy job well done OM. And as you say in your letter, "always in there boy."


V2UAE kept a schedule with V2RHU of Vildwood, N.J., who was a welcome visitor to our last club meeting.




