

THE BEGINNINGS


- Ed Raser, W2ZI Invites local hams and commercial radiomen to National Guard Armory to organize The Delaware Valley Radio Association in 1930.
- Incorporates 1931
- First Club License W3AQ
- Affiliates with ARRL




THE BEGINNINGS

- Ed Raser W2ZI Born in Bordentown
- WW1 Radioman in USN at Cape May
- Establishes a Radio Station at Eggert's Crossing NG Armory listed in 1930.
- Helps put in first radios for NJSP
- Establishes Old Timers Club
- Noted Radio Historian

DEPRESSION & RECOVERY – THE 1930'S


- Depression hits Money Scarce
- Clubs ceases operations for a short time in mid 1930's
- Recovery occurs with new public events
- 1938 State Fair Message Booth publicizes club.
- "Rescue of Admiral Byrd" Lectures to raise money for a club building.
- Hamfest begun at Trenton State Fairgrounds
- Field Day starts in 1939, and we are there.

POST WAR BOOM


- FCC moves all of New Jersey to the Second Call Area.



THE AGE OF MACHINES – 1970'S


- Migration of commercial VHF to narrow band makes wideband FM sets available.



- Supports many public service events.



SADDAM HUSSEIN HAS IT IN FOR US – THE 1990'S


- 1991 Gulf War means armory no longer feasible.

RETRENCHMENT – THE 2000'S

- Loss of funding means dues increase
- Dues increase means loss of members.
- Cell phones reduce cachet of mobile radio.
- Some bright spots are:
 - HF & VHF Contesting at shack by K2QM and W2SNJ
 - Field Day revived post 9/11 at Mercer County Park as more of an emergency exercise and fun event.
 - Radio Merit Badge Day started in 2005.
- 2011 windstorm results in repeater tower damage.
- Club has to spend money in 2012 to remove damaged repeater tower.
