May Minutes of the General Membership Meeting May 14, 2008

Our Lady of Good Counsel Church, W. Trenton, NJ

This general meeting of the Delaware Valley Radio Association (DVRA) was called to order by President T. Mark Bespalko, N2KIV at 1930.

NEW BUSINESS PRESIDENT

T. Mark Bespalko, N2KIV opened the floor for discussion of membership dues increase. The current proposal is to increase new membership application to \$50, \$45 for annual membership renewal and \$35 for student/senior citizen renewals. These proposed increases would be voted on at the July 9th meeting so mark your calendars.

Mark also announced there is still a portion of the grounds surrounding the DVRA shack that could be cleared. Tom Bagdas, NU2I, director of Public Information has identified someone to remove the dilapidated white storage container (and associated junk) from the property. Bob Schroeder, N2HX mentioned the gas tank could use some improvement as well.

Mark noted the association membership is not attracting as many new hams to DVRA functions. He stressed how traditional fundraisings such as the HAMFEST have lost some ground to sales on eBay. So the DVRA will be looking at new ways to expand our 'outreach activities' in the future. Send your suggestions for fundraisers to the appropriate DVRA director or officer.

DIRECTOR OF MEMBERSHIP

Stephanie Huston, KC2NSY reported there are 80 active hams in the DVRA (62 of which currently pay dues). Email reminders went out to those who have yet to pay. One application for membership was received from **Mark Juza, KC2TGM** will be voted on at our next meeting.

TREASURER

Stephanie Huston, KC2NSY reviewed the budget for the remainder of 2008. Proceeds from the Hamfest and purchase of a new Coffee pot and refreshments have left us with \$ 4,768.17. Pending payments to utilities, electrical repair, holiday party, shack renovations and field day expenses

will bring the balance down to \$348.61. Stephanie will look into the possibility of using PayPal account with the W2ZQ website to enable online payment of DVRA dues and fund donations. A fundraiser Craft Show is scheduled for November 15th so please mark your calendars now. In addition, there is advertising space available in the newsletter. The treasurer's report was voted on and accepted.

DIRECTOR OF PROGRAMS

Gary Wilson, K2GW mentioned the demonstration to be given at the Haldeman Ford dealership on Route 33 in Hamilton on Saturday May 17th from 10AM to 2PM. The Nottingham Ambulance Squad and other EMS personnel will be there with the Red Cross blood drive. Gary and Mark (N2KIV) reiterated upcoming events starting with the American Diabetes Association bike tour on Saturday, June 14th, which is a full day operation. More than a dozen hams volunteered last year. We would like to have more this year for the SAG wagon and a 'shadow.' In addition as a reminder the forth weekend in June is our own **DVRA sponsored Field Day in June, which runs the weekend of the 27-28-29**.

DIRECTOR OF TESTING & EXAMINATIONS

Don Wright, AA2F stated the next scheduled examinations are June 20th. Looking far ahead the scheduled location for November 15th examinations may be moved from the library, which is hosting a book sale to perhaps the Craft show in Montgomery.

POST MEETING PRESENTATION

Tim Reeg, K1TFR showed the skillful way to tie a number of different knots with ropes. These techniques will be put to good use during Field Day and of course is of practical use in other nonamateur activities as well.

May Minutes of the Director's Meeting May 14, 2008

The directors meeting of the Delaware Valley Radio Association (DVRA) was called to order by President T. Mark Bespalko, N2KIV at 1850.

President T. Mark Bespalko, N2KIV expressed concern over the budget and association membership and fundraising ideas.

Treasurer Stephanie Huston, KC2NSY explained the remaining budget for 2008. The hamfest raised \$746 to bring the balance to roughly \$4,914. Current invoices from lightening rod work, utilities and electrical work on shack bring the balance down to \$2,249. Estimated expenditures for the remainder of the year will deplete the budget to roughly \$349. This estimate does not include estimated profit/loss from the craft show this year.

Stephanie detailed current fundraising drives, which included advertising in the association newsletter "the Beacon," (\$75/2 years), Hamfest, Craft show, and coffee fund. In addition the idea

of a 'super 50/50' was floated. Bob Schroeder, N2HX mentioned the state license process required. Stephanie indicated we could get around some of that via a Trenton Thunder fundraiser,

Director of Membership Stephanie Huston, KC2NSY summarized the association's membership roster. It totals 80 active hams, of which 62 are paying dues. It had been as high as 120 members. Those whose membership lapsed have been e-mailed and will receive a post card reminder. Director of Programs, Gary Wilson, K2GW mentioned using the ARRL database to round up other area hams for upcoming meetings. An additional suggestion to enable membership dues payment or fund donations via the Internet through the W2ZQ website was made. Director OF Physical Plant, Hy Gold, AB2VG indicated he had a Pay Pal account but would not open another one.

Treasurer Stephanie Huston, KC2NSY talked about craft show on November 15th at Montgomery school. She will look into additional classroom availability for use in ham license examinations.

Physical Plant, H. Gold, AB2VG

Second Saturday: May 10 was a Second Saturday work program. Most of the work involved mowing the lawn (or fields, if you will!) where grass and brush had grown to six feet or more. Tom Distelkamp, KC2GYC donated a Craftsman Lawn Tractor along with the loan of a heavy duty gas-driven brush cutter, without which we really couldn't have accomplished much. As it is, with three hours of continuous mowing with the tractor, we cleared only about 75% of the North Field (the guyed tower) and maybe 50% of the South Field (crank up tower). Follow-up: The brush cutter was originally a loan; since then, Tom has decided to contribute it. So now we have everything we need to keep our pasture mowed. Also, Gerry N2GJ has kindly donated his father's old mower, which we can use to trim the lawn around the shack.

Subsequently, Tom NU2I and I came back to finish clearing the grass and brush from all of the North field and as much of the South field as we need to keep clear. We also observed that the grass grows briskly and we're going to need to cut it every 2 weeks or it will quickly get out of control.

Mark KC2SMS and Dave K2DRN did further mowing on Friday May 30, during which time the drive belt broke. I called KC2GYC to ask his advice and he said he would come over in a couple of days and install a replacement belt. I don't know what we would do without him.

It's going to take at least 30 man hours per summer to keep the grass mowed. Anyone who could help out with this on a regular basis would be tremendously helpful. Contact me at hygold@comcast.net or 609-392-6748 Tom NU2I will tell you that driving the tractor is a gas!

Shack Lighting: Dan K2QM and I installed a new pair of fluorescent fixtures over the operating positions. Center pair were replaced 2 years ago; third pair are old but seem to be OK.

When you enter the shack, the RIGHTMOST switch activates the contactor (which supplies power to the breaker panel in the far corner). It MUST be on. Then the second switch from the left will turn on the lights. I learned this the hard way.

The property is full of poison ivy; BE CAREFUL. I will be spraying as much of the fence as I can.

The next Second Saturday for shack maintenance is July 12 at 9AM. Please try to turn out. We will complete the outdoor work (shouldn't be too much to do by now). It's critically important that we MOUSE -PROOF the shack, which is our new #1 priority.

♦ News From ARRL HQ

American Red Cross Responds to ARRL Concerns Regarding Background Checks

In November 2007, ARRL President Joel Harrison, W5ZN, wrote to the American Red Cross (ARC) regarding concerns voiced by ARRL volunteers. In 2006, the Red Cross stated it would implement background checks that included, among other things, a credit check and a "mode of living" check for its staff and volunteers, including ARES volunteers providing services to the Red Cross during disasters. ARRL saw these portions of the background check as unneeded and inappropriate for ARES service.

In a letter dated May 8 of this year, Armond T. Mascelli, ARC Vice President for Disaster Response Services replied to President Harrison: "I can now report back to you that [these] actions have been completed and changes have been instituted which I trust resolves the concerns detailed in your letter. This effort took considerably more time and attention than originally envisioned, but I believe the results will now benefit our respective organizations.

"A new background consent form now [is] to be used by all Red Cross chapters for ARRL members and other partner organizations. The form and related process is limited to the name and social security number verification of the individual, and a criminal background check. References and suggestions to other related investigative possibilities have been stricken."

ARRL Emergency Preparedness and Response Manager Dennis Dura, K2DCD, announced the resolution at the ARRL ARES forum at the Dayton Hamvention® and received hearty applause.

"We are very pleased that the American Red Cross has addressed some of the issues that we raised regarding their background investigations and that we can move forward in a relationship that has existed for a long, long time," Harrison said. "The American Red Cross and the ARRL have shared a productive relationship for many years which has been of benefit to both the organizations and to the public. We are glad that throughout the past months we have been able to negotiate the issues that we had and have finally come to a resolution."

What's Next?

With the background check issue apparently resolved, the ARRL will be working with the ARC in the negotiation and creation of a draft for a new Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) or similar document to replace the one which expired last year; Dura and Keith Robertory of the ARC will be leading the effort. When complete, the draft of the MOU will be presented to the leadership of both organizations for approval.

"The ARRL is very pleased that the American Red Cross has responded appropriately to our concerns about the background check issue," said ARRL Chief Executive Officer David Sumner, K1ZZ. "We believe it now will be possible to go forward to negotiate a statement of understanding between the two organizations. We look forward to renewing and expanding the relationship with the Red Cross."


